In the first half of 2025, our Rabbis and activists continue to protest, calling for a ceasefire and the return of the hostages. The reality we face is unbearable. We are working through war and grief, watching the horrors in Gaza deepen, and confronting a government that chooses endless war over the lives of its own citizens.

Amid this pain, Rabbis for Human Rights has led solidarity tours for Rabbis, educators, and decision-makers to the Gaza border. There, we have listened to the testimonies of October 7th survivors, stood in protest against the war in Gaza, and prayed alongside people of all faiths for a future rooted in justice, compassion, and dignity for all.

### INTERFAITH MARCH

The streets of Jerusalem were filled with hope and prayer in May at the 3<sup>rd</sup> annual Interfaith March in Jerusalem for Human Rights and Peace. At a time of despair and suffering, we were moved to co-host a joint event of Muslims, Christians, Jews, and Druze - of many streams and denominations.

The March concluded with a prayer circle of hundreds of people calling for an end to war and for a time of Peace.

#### PROTECTIVE PRESENCE

Our protective presence efforts significantly ramped up in the first half WP hired 2025: new coordinators for Masafer Yatta and the Bethlehem region, joining our current Nablus and Jordan Valley coordinators. We assist already existing networks on the ground, offering a 24/7 protective presence to Palestinian communities threatened by settler violence and with limited access to their lands

#### WORKDAYS

Our workdays also significantly grew in 2025 - we established new relationships with Palestinian communities in Al-Khader and the Al-Makhrour valley, bringing volunteers weekly to assist in farming and agricultural projects.

#### PLANTING JUSTICE

The 2025 Planting Justice campaign ran from January to March, including weekly workdays supported by over 400 volunteers, who planted and donated 1,000 olive saplings.

This campaign not only restored land and hope but also deepened grassroots connections between communities and volunteers.



#### **HUMANITARIAN AID**

Palestinians in the West Bank have been facing a deepening economic crisis in recent years. The widespread revocation of work permits has left hundreds of thousands unable to earn a living in Israel. Military restrictions have locked down entire cities and villages, while settlers and state authorities continue to block access to agricultural lands - further intensifying the crisis.

In response, and in partnership with a coalition of organizations, we have been providing humanitarian aid in the form of food boxes to the most vulnerable communities.

During the month of Ramadan, we launched a special campaign that delivered over 840 food boxes to families across the West Bank.

This year we have begun delivering water tankers to Palestinian communities in the West Bank. We also provide a protective presence during these deliveries due to settler attacks. This is essential in response to the state's systematic control of water sources and the discriminatory allocation of this vital resource, diverting it from Palestinian communities to illegal settlements.

We hope this water helps families stay on their land, sustain their herds, and live with dignity.

This semester saw a significant increase in educational tours, including a Jerusalem series for several Mechinot, additional one-day tours in Jerusalem, tours of Bedouin society in the Negev, visits to Hebron, and an introductory tour of Haredi society. These encounters provided students with a deeper understanding of the diverse and complex social fabric of Israeli society. In addition, our team led many one-time educational sessions throughout the semester.

New educational content was developed through our Rabbis' Beit Midrash program, led by Rabbi Kobi Weiss, resulting in a syllabus centered on the Jewish value of the Sanctity of Life.
